2021 CROP WALK



A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR DAN



Future Glory

Romans 8:18-30

¹⁸ I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory about to be revealed to us. ¹⁹ For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God; ²⁰ for the creation was subjected to futility, not of its own will but by the will of the one who subjected it, in hope ²¹ that the

creation itself will be set free from its bondage to decay and will obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God. ²² We know that the whole creation has been groaning in labor pains until now; ²³ and not only the creation, but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly while we wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies. ²⁴ For in hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what is seen? ²⁵ But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience. ²⁶ Likewise the Spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but that very Spirit intercedes with sighs too deep for words. ²⁷ And God, who searches the heart, knows what is the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints according to the will of God. ²⁸ We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose. ²⁹ For those whom he foreknew he also predestined to be conformed to the image of his Son, in order that he might be the firstborn within a large family. ³⁰ And those whom he predestined he also called; and those whom he called he also justified; and those whom he justified he also glorified.

This past year has been hard and so many things have changed, some temporary and some permanent change. Change can be hard; it can be a time of sadness and/or a time of celebration. Everyone and every circumstance are different and requires a different response. I realize that Grossnickle Church has been through a tremendous amount of change in a very small amount of time. All of this change in the midst of a pandemic, it couldn't have been easy. So what do we do when we feel overwhelmed by all of the change and rollercoaster ride? How do we respond in a Christ like way, when we are yelling on the inside? For me I turn to the Word of God for direction – it never lets me down. The scripture that I have been leaning on a lot in this last year is from Romans 8. Where Paul talks about the comparison of suffering to the promise of God. Trusting in our faith to bring us through the uncertain times we face. Paul talks about how the Spirit intercedes and how we are predestined when we are part of Christ and He is part of us. Finally, Paul says that we who are predestined will be justified and this justification will lead us to glory.

Brothers and Sisters we are on this journey together and we need to rely on the Word of God, on one another and we will get through this. My experience is that the time of uncertainty and stress often lead to great growth. I believe that this is the season we are in. I'm not like your previous Pastors and you are not like my previous Churches. We are new to one another and we will make our way in a new way. We just need to show one another lots of grace and mercy and work with one another to better our circumstance. I'm praying to be here a long time (God willing) so we have time to really get to know each other and build on Grossnickle's foundation that has been laid for us. Won't you join me in this journey and see what fun we can have in the name of Christ?

REFLECTIONS FROM OUR 2021 ANNUAL CONFERENCE DELEGATES



2021 Annual Conference Reflection by Pam Jouannet...

What a mountain top experience!!!! Would like to say Thank You to GCOB for allowing me to represent us virtually. As many of you already know, I am quite challenged with technology. I felt a strong call from the Lord to be the Delegate. So, here's your report.....

One item of business that we voted on and passed was the VISION STATEMENT. (See the Vision Statement on the next page.) Three years ago, denominational leadership recognized that we had reached a critical moment in our life together. It could be said we were wandering without a sense of unified purpose. We were mired in soul-sapping conflict. Something needed to change. As a body, we were called into a time of intentional discernment. We dwelled in a challenging, disorienting, and uncomfortable, yet creative, exciting, and hopeful season of waiting and watching for God's presence and direction. Throughout, as a community, we were centered in Jesus Christ, guided by scripture, and led by the Holy Spirit, resulting in the emergence of a new, unifying, and compelling vision for the Church of the Brethren. (This is excerpts from the Compelling Vision Statement Report to Delegates).

We used our table talk to discuss the Vision Statement. One word that stood out and was discussed was fearless!! Most of us felt that we (COB) were very good at being the hands and feet of Jesus. We are strong in the commitment of helping others - feeding the hungry, clothing the poor, helping rebuild homes after natural disasters. But, we need to be the face and voice of Jesus to tell them why we do what we do – because the Lord calls us to do so. This is where we felt that we fall short. I'm very good at helping others, but I have a difficult time talking about Jesus. One Pastor from PA told us about his Congregation bringing boxes of food and supplies to the homeless. He asked a gentleman if he could pray with him. The man replied that so many come to help, but none offer to pray with/for them. Pastor Franklin said he thought a big sign that read "FREE PRAYERS" would be helpful!!

Folks, our Denomination is not growing. An article in the May *Messenger* issue titled "Where the Church is Growing" states, "On any given Sunday, it's estimated that there are more Christians worshiping in China than in the USA." "By 2025 (4 years), 40% of all Christians worldwide will be living out their faith in Africa." We need to find in our neighborhood new eyes and new voices. We need to be fearless in our speaking about Jesus. Radical transformation only occurs through the Holy Spirit. We need to go forward, speaking boldly of Jesus to our neighbors. We need to recognize the gifts of others in our own Congregation and encourage them. We need to live in a manner in which Jesus Christ can be seen through us. We need to tell our neighbors and community about the abundant blessing we have received by being a child of God. Share our stories.

This is scary and this is hard, but this is what we need to do. From my experience with trying to be the Delegate virtually, I know that the Lord Jesus will walk with us and guide us. For the Glory of God and our neighbor's good. Thanks be to God! And thank you for allowing me to represent Grossnickle.

2021 Annual Conference Reflection by Pastor Dan Johnson...

God's adventurous future was the theme of this year's Annual Conference. What an adventure it has been and was this year. The conference was all online, which was the first time in history that was the case and it was done from Elgin instead of some fancy conference hall. The focus this year was to finalize the compelling vision

statement that was presented several years ago. (See Vision Statement below.) The statement has been called Jesus in the neighborhood. A call for evangelism and more interaction with our neighborhood as a Church. Although the statement didn't deal with the "elephant" in the room like some would have hoped, I found it refreshing to think that we are looking at reaching out instead of in. Brothers and Sisters, I know that our denomination is fractured and we are seeing some leave in anger; however, I see this statement as a way for us to change our focus on what is different in us, to what we have in common. There is always going to be differences in our Church and communities. We need to focus on the goal, and that is Jesus. There were also the normal business items of elections and affirmations in which around 400 delegates voted on. There was wonderful worship in which the theme was unifying, calling the Church to refocus on Jesus. The insight sessions that were provided were varied in topic, but once again most were about unity.

Church, I know that things aren't perfect in the Church of the Brethren. I know that we have a long way to go to be the Church that Jesus has called us to be. As your Pastor I'm encouraged by the compelling vision and the direction of the denomination. I'm encouraged by the opportunity and call to be Jesus in the neighborhood and what that means to Grossnickle Church of the Brethren. We can choose to keep focusing on our differences like the world, or we can refocus on Christ who came to save and set us free. I know where my focus will be, how about yours?

NEWS FROM THE TRUSTEE COMMISSION THE PARSONAGE GETS A MAKE-OVER

Shortly after the first of the year, several of our members began the task of renovating the parsonage prior to the arrival of a new unknown pastor. At that point we had no idea what all would be involved, except for a thorough cleaning and some painting.

Once we got into it, the magnitude of what was needed hit us. To begin, all the cabinets, walls and ceilings needed to be cleaned prior to any painting being done. Then the whole house, including the inside of all the closets was repainted. The old carpet was removed from the upstairs and it was decided to not replace it but to have the oak floors under it sanded and refinished. The carpet in the basement was replaced with new carpet. The bathroom floors were in pretty good condition so they were left alone. The vinyl in the kitchen and dining area needed to be removed along with the underlayment. This was replaced with new waterproof laminate flooring. The stove and dishwasher needed to be replaced. The main bath had Pepto-Bismal pink wall tile which was all removed. The wall was then drywalled and painted with a woodgrain type tile around the toilet area. The vanity top and lavatory sinks were all replaced. A little other cosmetic type work was done in the bath, with the shower doors being removed and replaced with a curved shower curtain rod. The bath in the master bedroom needed to have the shower door replaced.

With most of the cosmetic work taken care of we had other major work to be done to the plumbing and electric. All the shut-off valves to all the sinks and toilets needed to be replaced, as well as all the drains. The electric in the bath rooms was redone so the lights and fans were on separate switches. All the receptacles near sinks in the bath and kitchen were replaced with GFI receptacles for safety purposes. Each of the exhaust fans needed to have new motors put in them or be replaced. The drain in the garage floor was rusted completely shut requiring a section of concrete floor to be cut out and new drain replaced. The entrance doors needed to be stripped to bare wood on the outside and repainted which took quite a few hours. All the hardware on each of the bi-fold closet doors was replaced as well as all the door lock hardware throughout the house.

With most of the work done new venetian blinds were installed throughout. At that point we asked for help to clean everything to finish. The call was answered by several of the ladies in the church. They worked really hard to clean all the windows and showers as well as the woodwork in the house.

The only work contracted out was the hardwood floors which was done by Antietam Flooring Service, the carpet in the basement by Hagerstown Floors, and Funk Plumbing repaired two drains which were copper and needed to be changed to work correctly.

Thanks go out to those who gave of time and materials. In total, less than \$10,000 was spent to accomplish what would probably have been closer to \$30,000 if it had all been contracted out. A total of over 540 hours was put in by

those involved: Pam Doyle—8 hours; Vicki Grossnickle—8 hours; Sylvia Lantz—13 hours; Sharon Leatherman—4 hours; Myralee Wiles—4 hours; David Doyle—154 hours; Marion Leatherman—22 hours; Alan Spade—50 hours; Glenn Lantz—280 hours.
